

CHURCH / LEADER DEVELOPMENT AND COMMUNICATIONS REPORT

Dr. Steve McNeil, Team Leader

It has been a good year for the Church/Leader Development Team. People have been trained, coached and empowered to engage in ministry throughout our state. During the 2016-2017 year, SCBI has worked with children, boys and dads, girls and moms, pastors, Sunday School and Small Group leaders and associational leaders. Our strategy is to “connect, consult and coach churches in accomplishing the Acts 1:8 challenge.” The next few pages are a brief description of the team activity that works to accomplish the above purpose.

The Church/Leader Development team consists of two part time directors, six regional strategists and two administrative assistants. They are Sarah Bohrer – Children’s Director, Allison Kinion – Women’s/WMU Director, Steve Blanchard, Bob Weeks, Doug Jividen, Bobby Cox, Dale Eakes, Mitch Whidden, Jesus Pacheco and our two administrative staff who are Bev Olonoh and Terah Adams.

At the writing of this report, we can report that we are saying goodbye to two of our team. Mitch Whidden is following a call from the Lord to return to the pastorate at a church in Kentucky, and Bev Olonoh is also following a call for a change in her life to retire from SCBI. She is now serving our Baptist Foundation of Indiana as the administrative assistant.

Through our team efforts between the Church/Leader Development Team and the Highland Lakes Baptist Camp Team, we have seen young people come to know Jesus as savior, seen others make big steps to being a more faithful follower of Jesus and some respond to a call to ministry. These two teams work seamlessly to make sure that camp and retreat participants have a good experience while they listen to what God is saying to them while attending one of our camps or retreats.

Here are few other highlights;

- Our fourth group of pastors completed a week of sharpening at the High Impact Leader Lab where 60 pastors have now completed this week of training, inspiration and coaching.

- Associational Leader Labs continue to draw pastors together to talk about how to be a better pastor, leader and preacher. Most associations around that state now have something that links our pastors together each month.
- Another group of leaders completed training to be an intentional interim pastor. These men will be able to go into a church that finds itself without a pastor. These trained interim pastors can walk the church through this time and train the search team in an effective process toward calling their next pastor. It is our goal to continue to train interim pastors so that we have a network of interim pastors that cover our state.
- We continue to train coaches to help us build a coaching network around the state to work with existing pastors and church planters.
- Over 100 people were trained at the Transform Group Teacher improvement workshop. This was a partnership between SCBI and LifeWay Christian Resources.

This team is currently being led by the newly elected Executive Director, Dr. Steve McNeil, who has led this team for the past 11 years. A search is underway at this time to find his replacement. In the following pages you will find reports from our team and see how God is using the SCBI team to impact our churches.

Children's Ministry

Sarah Bohrer, Director

Pure Girl is a weekend retreat at Highland Lakes Baptist Camp with the purpose of drawing moms, grandmas, mentors and girls closer to one another and closer to God. At Pure Girl 2016 - "God's Princess," Dana James challenged girls and moms to live their lives in a way that reflects Christ, using the story of Esther to remind them that they have been created "for such a time as this." Over and over, moms and girls remarked how special it was to set aside time just to spend together. One mom said, "I loved this! Moms are so hard on ourselves. I just needed reassurance." Pure Girl 2017, "Brave", will be September 22-23. It will include speaking by Chris Conrades, a Friday night party and pajama fashion show, breakouts on missions, archery, mother/daughter questions and awesome crafts. The day will conclude with a back to school fashion show that models how girls can be modest and "cool" at the same time.

At **Man Camp** - "Unbound," Doug Jividen challenged men and boys with the story of Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego, to live brave unbound lives for Christ. Men and boys gathered at Highland Lakes to grow closer to Christ and to one another. One boy said, "I loved everything! Especially the time with my dad!" Bo Warren led in worship, and it was encouraging to see men and boys singing praises to Jesus at the top of their lungs, lifting their hands to Him together in worship.

This year at **Mission Adventure Camp** (MAC) - "Rescued," over 200 kids and counselors worshiped and were challenged to be on mission for God by camp pastor, Rob Tuma. MAC not only draws the kids closer to Jesus, it draws the generations closer to each other. One man in his 70's has been a counselor for seven years. He began serving shortly after his wife died and said that he looks forward to ministering to the kids each summer. He made a difference! Not only did he serve as a counselor, but he also got up early each morning and walked the camp praying for the kids, missionaries and counselors. Throughout the week, we saw 16 kids accept Christ for the first time, and many more said that they wanted to share Christ with their friends and family and others said they felt called to be missionaries. A missionary who currently serves in Morocco shared what God is doing there and challenged the kids to pray for the people who need to hear about Jesus. Throughout the week, the kids gave an offering of \$400 that will help this missionary reach the lost of Morocco.

JAM (Jesus, Arts and Music) Camp is different from any other camp we do at SCBI. Many of the kids and students (grades 3-12) who attend come every year and make friendships that last a lifetime. They have the opportunity to choose from worship arts classes such as guitar, keyboard, vocal techniques, drawing, drums, dance, interpretive movement, balloon art puppets and more. These classes are led by talented volunteers from Indiana churches who volunteer their time, talents and passion for the week. It is amazing how much they can learn in one week! Many kids take what they learn back to their churches and begin to use their talents where God has planted them. This year, Rick Porter did a wonderful job serving as camp pastor, encouraging the kids to pray for and encourage one another. Throughout the week, six kids accepted Christ as Savior.

The 2016 reports from **Vacation Bible School** are beginning to come in from around the state. While the numbers for 2017 are not complete, the trends are showing that VBS in Indiana is in decline. VBS has historically been one of the most evangelistic tools of the church. It is still a very evangelistic tool that can be very effective. Some churches have begun looking at it more creatively by hosting backyard Bible clubs, weekend VBS, spreading it out one day a week throughout the summer or hosting it over fall or spring break. This may be a good option for those who are struggling through the

Women's Missions and Ministry

Allison Kinion, Director

In November of 2016, we held our first Ultimate Sleepover retreat for teen girls at Highland Lakes. The theme was "Anchored," and it was based around the Hebrews 6:19 passage. The camp proved to be a great setting for the girls to get away with their female leaders, mothers and mentors. The keynote speaker was Courtney Veasey. We had just over 100 campers in attendance.

In March and April, two Transformed women's retreats were held. The attendance was strong at both locations. The theme was "Thrive," and it was based around Psalm 1:1-3. The keynote speakers were LeighAnn McCoy and Katie Orr. Worship was led by Abby Howard Music and Sarah Scharbrough McLaughlin. One event was held at Graceland Baptist Church in New Albany and the other at Sunnycrest Baptist Church in Marion. There were several salvation and restoration decisions made between the two locations.

Indiana WMU began a strategic approach to reach out to churches to encourage intentional missions education/involvement efforts. Our newly elected President, Dr. Linda Clark, having retired from the California Baptist Convention as the Women's Missions and Ministry Director, has brought a tremendous set of leadership skills to our state WMU Leadership team. We are actively seeking WMU Leadership representation in seven of our associations who currently do not have representation: Northwest, Southeast, Southwest, Wabash Valley, West Central, White River, and White Water. These Associational leaders:

- advocate for missions education as an avenue for engaging others in mission activities;

- are familiar with WMU and its structure;
- are willing to relate to the churches, pastors and staff in their association in relation to missions education;
- strive to be visible and involved in their association at associational meetings and gatherings.

On August 5, 2017, the Missions Lifeline Conference and Kids Missions Mini Camp was held. It was a tremendous success with around 135 registering for the one-day event held at Calvary Baptist Church in Greenfield. We had multiple missions related breakout conferences for pastors, missions leaders and missions minded people to attend. Kids, birth-6th grade, learned about SBC Missions work in Russia as they went through the 2018 International Missions Study. We heard from the Hennie Family, our missionaries, as well as Dr. Steve Davis. Worship was led by the praise band from Hope Community Church in Brownsburg. Disaster Relief brought their shower/laundry unit, recovery unit and command center for the people to tour. They also lead a conference on how churches can be involved in Disaster Relief. We are excited about offering Missions Lifeline next year on August 11, 2018 at Calvary Baptist Church in Greenfield.

Worship Ministry

One of the defining characteristics of a biblical church is the act of worship practiced by its members. Worship is not just music. It includes expressions of praise, confession, exhortation and response in many different forms; but, the singing of hymns or worship songs together is an important collective action taken by the members of God's confessing congregation.

As I visit churches across the state, I have seen many styles of music with all kinds of accompaniment and leadership. My goal in the past year has been to help the people use their best talents to praise God with their song.

We provided several events that helped train Indiana Baptists in worship ministry. One of these was the **Exalt Him Student Worship Retreat** held at Highland Lakes Camp April 21-22. This event was designed for junior high and senior high students. The retreat was led by Lexington Road, a worship team from Boyce College in Louisville, KY on the campus of The Southern Baptist

Theological Seminary. The speaker for the weekend was Bryan Sullivan, a church planter from Redeemed Community Church in Fairland. Other leaders came from other churches across Indiana. About 40 people in all were involved.

Another opportunity for training was a worship arts camp that we also conducted at Highland Lakes Camp called **JAM Camp and Super JAM**, July 18-22. This camp was geared for two groups of students, JAM Camp for older children, third through sixth grade, and Super JAM for those in junior high and senior high. The camp offered not only worship led by The Pointe Worship from Fort Wayne but also classes in all kinds of worship arts: drama, singing, playing instruments, photography, sound production, presentation software, balloon art, worship band, black light and creative movement among others. Camp pastors, Rick Porter and Dan Defriece, clearly explained the gospel, and the campers responded. We saw at least three children and three students profess faith in Christ. There were many rededications as well. The two camps, including leaders, had a total of 140 attendees.

During the past year, my wife, Cathy, and I partnered with Josh Crisp and others to help initiate Gospel Grove Church in Bargersville, IN. I served the church as worship leader for several months to assist them in getting this ministry started in the church. We have also served in other leadership capacities as well in the church.

I also was involved in worship leader training by teaching breakout sessions at Worship 424 through Cedarville University in January. This was a major worship conference that attracted over 600 people in the mid-western states and beyond.

REGIONAL REPORTS

Central Region

God is the ultimate leader of all the churches in his Kingdom, but he has also entrusted those churches to shepherds, church pastors, who have taken care of the flocks under their care. I have sought to partner with these leaders in several vital ways.

First, I took part in the third **High Impact Leader Lab** held at Highland Lakes Camp April 24-27. This event is a leadership development opportunity that our convention has provided to help a limited, invited group of pastors from across the state to understand how leadership should develop in their churches, not only for themselves but for their congregation as well. A goal of this week was to help pastors come up with their own Personal Leadership Development plan.

Besides assisting with the teaching during the Leader Lab, I also was a coach for one of the pastors who attended. We have continued to meet for monthly coaching sessions since the Leader Lab week.

Coaching has been an important part of my relationship to church planters and some other leaders as well. Some of this has been more informal for the latter category of leaders.

My primary territory has been with **Crossroads Baptist Association** in central Indiana, which includes all of Indianapolis and the surrounding counties. In my role with Crossroads Association, I have helped several churches affiliate with the SBC. These have included Jesus Christ Worship Center, a young Haitian church in Indianapolis and Geist Community Church in McCordsville.

I also helped organize and lead an association re-visioning retreat in October for Crossroads Association. We invited Stan Albright, Pastor of First Baptist Church, Albany, GA and former Association national network leader to facilitate the retreat. This event brought together ten Crossroads pastors: Roger Kinion, John Dimmick, John Horn, Guy Lancour, Scott McDowell, Hre Mang, Reginald Fletcher, Ernie James, Kenny Stevens, Jim Bohrer

and myself. During this retreat we:

- reviewed important turning points in the life of the association and their impact,
- identified our perceived identity,
- reviewed our reason for existing and looked at how we currently function,
- proposed a means of relating together effectively and
- designed a preferred organizational profile.

As a leadership team, we have focused this past year on bringing pastors and church planters together in a variety of ways, including area meetings where we used the Leader Lab format to address key issues in the church.

North Region

This has been a strong year in working with churches in individual strengthening and leadership. My focus for our churches in North Central, Miami, East Central and Northwest associations has been meeting the needs of leaders and churches with the foundations of ministry.

One of the ways in which we can meet needs of pastors and leaders in foundational discussion and training is in our monthly Leader Labs. We have had consistency in our Leader Labs in all three associations and a fourth, called Pastor's Round Table, in Northwest association led by Wes Rankin. These Labs have been a springboard of discussion dealing with some of the most difficult issues that churches and pastors face in a facilitated discussion. From that, we have opened doors to other trainings.

This year we have coached seven planters, which is expected of our catalyst position. We are working on those that are planting, those that are working to be assessed and those that have completed their funding but still want assistance. We have also coached pastors that have desired to grow further in their ministry through coaching. We have ministered to six of our SCBI pastors to work through issues of the church, growth in personal ministry and transitions from one ministry to the next. It has been a blessed time to see God at work.

This year, Claude King came to develop churches in the ministry

of Prayer for East Central Association and Northwest Association. Claude spoke of having a Prayer Boot Camp and how to implement this in your church.

Our region was impacted by being a part of the HILL. Those in attendance were significantly impacted and challenged to take these tools back to their churches and regions. In light of this, we had a Building Teams workshop in Northwest directly as a result of the HILL this year.

Our region was also well represented in our statewide coaching training. We now have four men that are trained to assist in coaching both for planters and existing church pastors. We were represented in the Intentional Interim Training as we desire to develop more and more interims for our region.

I am consistently a part of the executive leadership teams in the regions and that relationship helps communicate between our churches and associations to our state staff and leadership.

It has been a great year and a pleasure to serve our Indiana churches.

West Region **Bob Weeks**

The SCBI Western Region extends from Monticello to Vincennes and from the Illinois border to a tip just north of Indianapolis. Contained within that 9,000 square mile territory is the oldest Southern Baptist Church at Hymera, where the building once served as a bar and one of the newest SBC Churches, the First Baptist Church of Linton.

As with any family, the collection of churches is very different: large, small, elder led, deacon led, small group driven, old school Sunday School, wailing guitars with skinny jeans to single instrument worship leaders directing the congregation to sing out. Like fingerprints and snowflakes each church is unique - just the way God planned it. However, our strength is not in our uniqueness. Our strength is in our unity. Together we are better!

As a Regional representative of SCBI, I am often called upon to assist a church when they have fallen ill. I have even been asked to help one die. But how does a church know when it is ill? When our body is sick, God designed it to experience pain to alert us that

something is wrong. Not so with the church. To understand the health of a church you must look closely and carefully.

A great way to do that is to utilize one of our Church Health Assessment tools. If you would like to know how healthy your church really is, we can help. While dying is a reality of life, I struggle seeing how the King gets glory when a church dies. Do not wait until it is too late.

Many pastors say to me, “I don’t know what to do next.” They are not speaking about preaching, they know how to preach. They are not talking about visiting at the hospital, they know how to do that. They are not talking about the day-to-day stuff at all. These pastors are referring to Vision - the direction of the church. “How do I lead this body to accomplish what God has put us here to do?” If that is you, your Catalyst can help! Without Vision, the people perish!

Each passing day draws us closer to His Coming. The Hope of the World is wrapped up in the Bride of Christ. Let’s round the last curve with our eyes on the prize, arms and legs pumping, leaning toward the finish line. We are in this together. You, the State Convention, the SBC and your fellow pastors. Together we are better!

East Region

Greetings from the 56 churches that comprise the East region of Indiana Baptists. This region is made up of 18 counties. There are three associations (Eastern, South Central and Whitewater) that attempt to evangelize and disciple the nearly 408,000 people that call the region home. It is truly my honor to serve Indiana Baptists in the East region in the areas of Church Planting Catalyst in conjunction with Church/Leader Development and Communications. I submit this report to the State Executive Board for 2016-2017. This report includes the health status of Men’s Ministry and the Church Renewal Journey Weekend.

A regional Coaching/Mentoring II training was scheduled for March 2017; however, due to scheduling conflicts, the training was postponed until the Fall. I have had the privilege to coach several men during the year in the area of Coaches Training Coaches, a training I assisted with at HLBC that would help

pastors feeling called to this great ministry. I also assisted with the Long Term Intentional Interim Training. I have also coached/discipled two men on a one on one basis in person and via Coachnet. I have had several coaching relationships with church planters as well a couple from the High Impact Leader Lab.

Whitewater Association hosted an evangelism booth at Canal Days in Metamora, distributing Bibles and tracts as well as taking prayer requests and seeking gospel conversations when possible. Mary assisted with the planning of the Regional Women's retreat hosted by Smyrna Baptist Church in October 2016. Over one-hundred women gathered to worship as "Women of Freedom." According to the evaluations, one was saved and several rededicated their lives to Christ. These events are a joint effort of Eastern, South Central and Whitewater associations. The Transform LifeWay training has been advertised within the region, encouraging churches to send their Sunday School leaders for training. A new community Bible study has been started at Morning Breeze Assisted Living Facility in Greensburg where 10-12 people gather on Wednesday evening to study the Bible. One man has professed Christ and is awaiting Baptism in the near future.

Several churches in the East Region were without pastors during the year, so I had the opportunity to serve as interim or fill in at First Baptist, Knightstown (one young lady professed Christ and was baptized during this time), Calvary New Castle, and First Southern, Sunman. First Baptist Knightstown felt led to merge with Total Restoration, so Pastor John Maples and his core group joined them. Calvary New Castle celebrated Pastor Bobby Slagle's retirement July 23rd, and they have called Randy Sidwell as their new pastor. First Southern Sunman has called Donnie Yates as their interim pastor, and they are doing well. Leader Labs have been (or are being) developed in all three associations; South Central's Leader Lab has been very successful with 8-10 in attendance on a regular basis. The other two associations are still being developed.

In the area of Church Renewal Journey, a ministry arm of the North American Mission Board (NAMB). NAMB answers the question of "What is the Church Renewal Journey?" A churchwide process of awakening God's church, equipping and discipling it's members and sending them out with the joy of serving in the

unique way God has called and gifted them, where they receive the Joy and God receives the Glory. There are five major steps in the Journey, consisting of Lay Led weekend events; these include: **Lay Renewal Weekend, Lay Ministry Weekend, Marketplace Evangelism Weekend, Prayer Weekend, and Acts 1:8 Weekend.** If you would like more information, please contact me at bcoc@namb.net.

In the area of Men's Ministry - "Legacy" was the theme of the 2016 State Men's Retreat. There were over 100 in attendance - men from all over the state came together to be challenged on what it means to have a "Living Legacy" and why. Several decisions were made for God's glory. Dr. Greg Frizzell was the keynote speaker. The evaluations were mostly positive; however, there is always room for improvement. Southwest Region **Dale Eakes**

Many times, it seems, when we begin a discussion of established churches, we tend to approach that subject with disappointment. It seems often that we talk a lot about lost potential and stagnant ministries. However, in southwest Indiana, there is great excitement as we see the movement of God among many of our churches.

This year has been a year that many churches decided they were tired of not being relevant in a community filled with lost people and decided to do something about it. It is amazing at how many of these "new" ministries were born out of prayer and a burden to see the lost saved. It would be impossible to cover every church and every ministry, but I would like to highlight a few of them.

First Baptist Church Rockport is a rural church that in many ways has seen decline for the past several years. Yet, this past year, they are seeing things move in a different direction. With a renewed emphasis in reaching the lost around them, they have developed ministries that focus on the needs of the community and have seen a great response. They have a food ministry that prepares meals for the kids every week. SCBI has been able to help assist in the preparation and support of this meal. FBC has

continued to use this ministry, not just as a feeding time, but truly as a way to reach out to the families of those children involved. They have also developed ministries to help distressed families and those with financial problems. It is refreshing to see a rural church with a renewed heart to reach and impact their community for Christ.

Northeast Park Baptist Church in Evansville has also begun a journey to turn around from their days of decline. They started the process in January 2017 with a congregational meeting to discuss their situation. Since that meeting, they have met multiple times and are currently working with different teams in the congregation to develop a strategy to become significant in their community for the sake of the Gospel. They have shown a willingness to make the necessary adjustments to renew their focus for Kingdom ministries. SCBI has been able to walk with them on the entire journey as they seek God's guidance.

New Beginnings Community Church, Loogootee is another rural church making a fresh start. They have had multiple baptisms this year and have celebrated an attendance that has almost doubled from last year. In this community, many homes are financially wanting. Many kids that go without food on a regular basis. New Beginnings felt led to help in this area. At first, it started with a few lunches on a Saturday but has now grown to a weekly ministry that local organizations and businesses help support. They are currently looking to move to a new facility because their existing facility has reached max capacity. SCBI has been able to support them with resources, coaching and training opportunities to assist in their rapid growth.

New Life in Poseyville continues to move in a positive direction for the Lord's glory. As of the writing time of this report, New Life has baptized 17 people since January 2017. For a church in a rural community, that many people do not even know exist, they have made significant strides in spreading the Gospel. They have done this simply by being obedient and building relationships with those around them.

These are just a few brief stories of how God is moving in several of our churches. Many more could be added to the list. God is an awesome God, and it is amazing to see so many churches seeking to follow His will and bring glory to His name.

We continue to see more and more churches partnering together for the sake of ministry. It is refreshing to see them work as partners in the ministry and not as competitors. From block parties and construction projects to evangelism opportunities, churches are teaming together to spread God's love to the lost communities of Southwest Indiana.

Our challenge, as we approach 2018, is to see a continued increase in leadership development to assist our churches as they continue to grow and spread the Good News of Jesus Christ. We will keep working to focus on revitalization and training to help assist our churches as they move forward in the ministry.

Southeast Region

God is doing great things in Southeast Indiana! While thinking about the activity of God this year, three words come to mind: Revision, Revitalize and Rethink.

Revision

John Horn and Gary Yochum have been leading a revisioning team for our region through the important process of revisiting the vision of God. This vision team is made up of several pastors in our area who are motivated and interested in seeing God at work throughout our area. This process has been developed in a team environment and will continue to be approved by the executive board of the southeast association. While this is not a brand-new vision for southeast association, it is a sharpening of the focus for the churches of our area to make greater kingdom impact.

Revitalize

Revitalization of churches in our area has been a marker for this year's progress in the southeast region. Palmyra Baptist Church has undergone an intentional process to become a satellite of Graceland in New Albany. This will help expand God's Kingdom in Palmyra by reaching out to the community and bringing much needed resources to the area. New Hope Baptist Church in Clarksville has been undergoing some rapid changes through an intentional coaching process as well as engaging with our mission partners in North Carolina who have helped to encourage and strengthen this body of believers. First Baptist Church of Crothersville has undergone evangelistic

trainings and worked through several changes to bring health and unity to the body. I am finishing up as their interim pastor at the end of August and am excited to what God has for them in the future. We are also excited to announce that leader labs have been instituted in our region. Our first two leader labs were well attended and have helped strengthen and encourage our pastors. We look forward to continuing leader labs in the future.

Rethink

In order to rethink the importance of evangelism, we have reached and exceeded last year's goal of four churches to involve this year in evangelistic training. To my surprise, we have involved First Baptist Crothersville, First Baptist Charlestown, New Hope, Refuge, The Bridge, River Ridge and Walnut Ridge churches in evangelistic trainings this year. The importance of rethinking how we pray for and evangelize the lost cannot be overstated.

Church health continues to be a priority of southeast Indiana churches. Our heart as leaders is to keep this as a main priority for the year ahead.

Communications Report

The purpose of the Communications Team is to tell the **SCBI story** throughout the year. It is to help churches see and hear about what other SCBI churches are doing and to help them network for the betterment of the Kingdom.

To accomplish this task, we utilize the quarterly Indiana Baptist Magazine, the website (www.scbi.org) and social media. It is **our goal** to communicate the stories that are happening around Indiana, to communicate where our churches can find relevant resources and tools to help them in their pursuit to grow His church, to strengthen existing churches and to work toward all of SCBI churches participating in healthy church planting. We encourage you to send your stories about what is happening in your church.

Our quarterly **state magazine**, the Indiana Baptist Magazine, can be read both in print and online at www.scbi.org/ib. This subscription is free and available upon request to any SCBI church

member. Our magazine has a current subscription list of 6,563. There are 142 people who currently get email notification when the magazine is posted online. Within 30 days of posting the magazine, there was an average of 162 unique page views. SCBI also utilizes Facebook, Twitter and email to communicate with the SCBI churches.

The SCBI **website** is the most current place to find information about events and resources that are available through SCBI.
